To residents within the UPZ (approx. 5-30km radius away from the nuclear plant)

Sheltering indoors during a nuclear disaster is the first step to staying safe



If a state of Alert is issued, firstly collect your children from school, return home and listen to the TV etc. for information while staying indoors.

In a nuclear disaster, it is important to stay calm and await correct information and instructions from public authorities. **Staying in the home, "Sheltering indoors," is the first step to staying safe.***

* Going outdoors can greatly increase your risk of exposure if radioactive material is somehow released from the nuclear power plant.

* If everyone tries to evacuate far away all at once, this can lead to confusion and accidents, thus leading to increased risks.

Keep this booklet where it can be clearly seen.




Sheltering indoors

POINT

If the order to shelter indoors is given, take refuge at home or in a nearby building and protect yourself from exposure.

Getting inside is important; whether it's your home or workplace, public facilities or a nearby building (indoors).



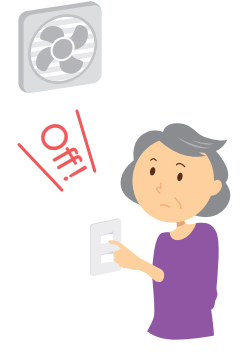

Close all doors and windows.




3

Shut off ventilation fans.
* Air conditioners that do not take in outside air can also be used while Sheltering indoors. (check to see what type of air conditioner is installed at home).

Anyone returning from outside should thoroughly wash their hands and face.

Food should be sealed in containers or wrapped up.




6


Water should also be stored in airtight containers, just in case.



Remove any clothing worn outside, store it in a plastic bag and tightly seal the bag, especially if instructed to do so.




Take a shower and wash your hair, especially if instructed to do so.



Taking shelter in a concrete building is safer.


Wood can reduce internal exposure from inhalation to approximately 25%.



Wooden houses

External exposure is also cut by approximately 10%.

Concrete can reduce internal exposure from inhalation to approximately 5%.




Concrete buildings


External exposure is also cut by approximately 40%.

Follow these guidelines


- Get accurate information from TV, radio and emergency alerts, etc.
- Pay attention to information provided by PR vehicles and official disaster prevention radio channels.
- Avoid going outside unnecessarily and wait inside until instructed otherwise.
- Do not be misled by rumors or misinformation and follow the information from the national government, prefecture, and municipalities.
- Unless the matter is urgent, do not make phone calls.
